If Jesus sat across from you at a coffee shop as a real person, what do you imagine that conversation would be like?

What does it take for you to feel *heard*, *understood*, or *seen* by someone else?

Does the humanity of Jesus affect the way you feel *heard*, *understood*, or *seen* by God?

Read Galatians 4:4–7 together. What words, phrases, or themes stand out to you from the passage?

How does Jesus' full humanity (being "born of a woman") safeguard the truth of the gospel? What would be lost if Jesus were only divine?

The *Judaizers* treated Jesus as an addition to their religion rather than its fulfillment, because they misunderstood God's law. How does something like that happen, and in what ways can the modern church be tempted to do the same thing?

The passage describes Christ as "the one who carried the full weight of the law." **How does** that deepen your understanding of grace?

As we've journeyed through the Imago Dei series, what key theological themes or shifts have you been processing?

What might it look like in your life to live as someone adopted (free, loved, and secure) rather than as someone trying to earn God's approval?

In the sermon, we discussed how the human aspect of Jesus' life means we can no longer separate our actions from our faith. What does that mean to you, and why is that such an important part of how we understand Christ within the Imago Dei framework?

The sermon ended by saying that "a whole new humanity begins" in Jesus. Where do you see glimpses of that new humanity in your life today?
