Paul's teaching implies that resurrection doesn't replace the physical, it redeems and glorifies it. How does that challenge or affirm your understanding of heaven and the afterlife?

N.T. Wright says Christian hope is "the renewal of all things." How is that different from simply "escaping" this world?

How does Jesus' resurrection affirm that **creation still matters**? What does that teach us about the importance of our bodies, our work, and our world?

How can we carry our "scars" in a way that brings healing or faith to others, like Jesus did with Thomas?

Think about the line: "Do you see the world through the lens of resurrection?" What might that look like in your daily rhythms; at home, work, or in community?

What's one example of a "resurrection moment" you've seen recently; a place where something dead or broken came back to life?
