Life

When things go wrong in your life, what is usually your first instinct: to ask why it's happening, or to try to fix it quickly?

Can you think of a time when something you relied on for security failed you? How did that experience shape you?

Read 1 Samuel 4:1-10.

- Why did Israel believe bringing the Ark into battle would guarantee victory, even though their relationship with God was broken? Why did that belief fail them and where do we see similar forms of spiritual superstition today?

In **1 Samuel 4:11-22**, we see the death of Eli, the death of Phinehas' wife, and the naming of a parentless child. What does this section of the story represent about the state of Ancient Israel? (Ichabod)

While Israel is experiencing a season of devastation, God is actually preparing a better future for them. Have you ever endured a season like that? Where your life was emptied, and yet, behind the scenes, the Lord was preparing something incredible for you?

How does the death at Beth Shemesh in **1 Samuel 6:19–20** show that God's holiness applies to Israel just as much as to the Philistines? What theological impact does this have on our faith?

in **1 Samuel 7**, What are the striking differences about the way that Israel faces another Philistine threat, as compared to what unfolded in chapter 4?

In **1 Samuel 7:3–4**, Samuel calls Israel to put away foreign gods and return to the Lord. What might similar rhythms of repentance look like in our modern lives?

Israel's victory in **1 Samuel 7:10** comes after *surrender*, not *strategy*. Where might God be inviting you to *trust* rather than *control*?

Close by having a volunteer read Hannah's doxology (1 Samuel 2:1-10) out loud, while everyone else in your group listens. What do you notice about Hannah's prayer this time around? What words, phrases, or ideas are you drawn to? Why do you think that is?
